History of WOCF

The World Olympic Collectors' Fairs (WOCF) are events for collectors of sporting items and Olympic memorabilia. The WOCF was first held in October 1994 in Lausanne, Switzerland, on the occasion of the opening of the Olympic Museum.

The fairs are organized by the International Association of Olympic Collectors (AICO), formerly FIPO, in cooperation with its member organizations. The Fair was held every year, and the hosting location changes in order to provide opportunities for meeting, exchanging, and exhibiting the Olympic heritage to an ever-growing number of enthusiasts.

In the history of the WOCF, there have been exceptions to the above: out of the first twelve WOCFs, a full nine fairs took place in Lausanne. Since 2007, the WOCF hosting baton has truly been passed around the world. The WOCF was not held in 1996, 2008, and 2024 due to the opportunity for Olympic collectors to meet directly at the Olympic Games venues. In the years 2020–2022, the worldwide COVID-19 pandemic prevented the WOCF from taking place. Conversely, in 2010, two WOCFs were held, namely in Cologne, Germany, and Beijing, China.

The purpose of the WOCF is to enable fans and collectors of Olympic memorabilia to meet regularly, strengthen old friendships and forge new ones, and facilitate the mutual exchange, purchase, or sale of Olympic items.

History of the World Olympic Collectors' Fair WOCF Prague 2025

First, a few words about the organizer of this Fair, the OLYMPSPORT society.

The Olympic and sports philately society **OLYMPSPORT** was founded in 1966 and is one of the oldest such societies in Europe. It stood at the birth of, and is a founding member of, international organizations – FIPO in 1994, and AICO in 2014.

An integral part of the activities of the AICO organization, and the former FIPO, is the organization of world exhibitions of Olympic philately under the name **OLYMPHILEX**. While the first of these was held in Lausanne in 1985, the Olympsport society organized its first specialized thematic exhibition on Olympic and sports themes back in 1970, with others following subsequently.

Olympsport, as a thematic society, is part of the Union of Czech Philatelists and is a collective member of the Czech Olympic Academy. Currently, it brings together mainly those interested in sports and Olympic philately, but in line with the focus of the AICO organization, it strives for the increasing involvement of collectors from other fields as well.

In 2023, representatives of Olympsport attended WOCF Paris 2023, where they were approached by representatives of the AICO Executive Committee with an offer to participate in the selection process for organizing the fairs in 2025, 2026, and 2027. Upon returning home, the Olympsport representatives began to seriously consider this possibility.

In August 2023, the AICO Executive board officially launched a tender for the organization of the world fairs in 2025–2027. In October 2023, the Olympsport committee decided to bid for the organization of the fair in **2025**. This year was not chosen by chance – 2025 marked the **100th anniversary of the "VIII Olympic Congress"** held in Prague in 1925.

On November 5, 2023, the AICO Executive Committee announced that it had selected Olympsport to host the 28th World Olympic Collectors' Fair. This selection was subsequently confirmed by the IOC's Olympic Foundation for Culture and Heritage. The first official meeting of the WOCF Prague 2025 Organizing Committee took place in Prague on January 10, 2024, symbolically at the Hotel Olympik.

The Organizing Committee was supplemented in August 2024 with the following members:

The Organizing Committee made the following decision at this meeting:

Date of WOCF Prague 2025: The Fair will take place from May 29 to June 1, 2025, which is the same period during which the VIII International Olympic Congress was held in Prague 100 years ago (May 29 – June 4, 1925).

Venue of WOCF Prague 2025: The Organizing Committee decided to organize WOCF Prague 2025 at the Hotel Olympik. The hotel is located in the Prague district Karlin, only 4 metro stops from the center. The hotel was built during the time Prague was bidding to host the 1980 Olympic Games. It is now a complex of 3 buildings with a large congress center (capacity of approximately 230 exhibitor tables), a large restaurant and bar, and of course, accommodation (capacity of over 500 rooms for more than 1,200 visitors). Everything in one place... The Sběratel international fair has been held in the same complex for many years, with the participation of over 5,000 collectors and visitors. A large parking area in front of the hotel is a matter of course.

Program: An informative time schedule for the individual days May 29 – June 1, 2025.

Other Important Milestones:

- March 1, 2024: A communiqué on cooperation in organizing the Fair was signed between the presidents of AICO and OLYMPSPORT.
- **December 15, 2024:** The WOCF Prague 2025 logo was officially approved and published. (For the logo development, see a separate chapter.)
- January 25, 2025: Official launch of the website and commencement of registration.



Call for Expression of Interest

Organization of World Olympic Collectors' Fairs for 2025, 2026 and 2027

World Olympic Collectors' Fair Background

The International Olympic Committee supports the Olympic collector movement by granting patronage to different forms of Olympic collector activities as well through the direct assistance of the Cultural and Olympic Heritage Commission. The World Olympic Collectors Fair, which has been an almost annual event since 1994, is an expression of the IOC's support.

The World Olympic Collectors' Fairs are excellent opportunities for Olympic enthusiasts to share their combined interests in Olympic history and collecting. The Fair has travelled around the globe visiting past and future Olympic host cities.

The Fair can be organized in any appropriate place, however, this would be an excellent opportunity for museums which are members of the Olympic Museum Network to organize the event. The benefits of holding the Fair are many:

- Collectors and the public are made aware of the museum's collections;
 This is an opportunity for the museum and collectors, who are very often highly knowledge experts in different domains of Olympic history and memorabilia, to exchange information:
- 3. It provides the environment for the museum to increase its own holdings.

The IOC considers that a primary duty of AICO is organising events such as fairs and exhibitions associated with Olympic philately, numismatics and memorabilia.

The IOC Cultural and Olympic Heritage Commission and AICO are responsible for accepting proposals from entities wishing to host a World Olympic Collectors' Fair. Currently, we are accepting proposals for Fairs to be conducted in 2025, 2026 and 2027.

The Call is open to all organisations/institutions which are in compliance with the regulations of the IOC and Olympic Charter, as well as with all applicable laws and regulations, and who maintain a practice reflecting the principles of good governance at the time of the Event.

The list of eligible Prospective Organisers includes, but is not limited to:

- a. Olympic Games Organizing Committees;
 b. National Olympic Committees;
- International Sports Associations recognized by the IOC;
- d. Members of the Olympic Museum Network;
 e. Members of AICO, the International Olympic Collectors Association.

The purpose of this Call is to identify eligible candidates to organize the World Olympic Collectors Fair in 2025, 2026 and 2027. To qualify for consideration, Applicants must submit an EXPRESSION OF INTEREST by 15 October 2023. This document must include the following information:

- Fair location (city/country) and duration (dd/mm/yy) to dd/mm/yy);
 Information on main objective/s of the Fair and the relationship of the Fair, if any, to other Olympic/sports celebrations to be held at the same time;
 Information on any support and/or involvement of the NOC;
 Main accompanying events and activities planned for Fair participants (e.g. any

- cultural or social events, tours, etc.); e. Prospective financial resources

If there are multiple candidates to host the WOCF in any one year, a competitive procedure will be applied. ARCO will initiate a dialogue with all parties to define, in the best interests of the family of Olympic collectors, a schedule of successful candidates.

3. Expected WOCF Start Dates and Durations

The Fairs are expected to start not earlier than May/June. The duration of the WOCF should be 3-4 days and include a weekend.

It is expected that the Organizer will be responsible for financing the WOCF. However, once selected, the Organizer may apply for the financial support from the IOC, based on the assumption that the Fair is a non-profit event.

The Czech Association for Olympic and Sport Philately OLYMPSPORT and the International Association of Olympic Collectors AICO are pleased to formalize the dates of the World Olympic Collectors' Fair of Prague 2025.

The official program and all the terms of participation will be unveiled in December 2024.



WOCF Logo and its Evolution

Immediately after Prague was officially awarded the WOCF 2025 organization, the Organizing Committee contacted two graphic designers to request a draft logo for the Fair. The logo was required to contain the mandatory information while simultaneously symbolizing Prague as the heart of Europe and, if possible, commemorating the 100th anniversary of the 1925 International Olympic Congress. The following four variants were shortlisted:





The Organizing Committee decided to proceed with Variant No. 4, which the designer elaborated upon following comments, resulting in a design that was sent to the Olympic Foundation for Culture and Heritage. However, this version was not approved, and it was recommended that the combination of multiple logos within a single design - specifically the logo of the 1925 Olympic Congress in Prague and the Olympsport company logo - be removed, thereby avoiding a "logo within a logo."

The logo was subsequently modified according to the committee's requirements. However, it still featured the silhouette of the "Dancing House," architecture of which is protected by copyright. Given the time required to obtain permission to use the silhouette and to avoid all possible issues, the silhouette of the Dancing House was replaced with a building that does not require such permission/approval.



Exhibition "International Fairs and Exhibitions with Olympic and Sports Theme – FIPO, OLYMPEX, OLYMPHILEX, AICO, WOCF)"

In the lobby of the Hotel Olympik Congress Center, Olympsport prepared an exhibition for visitors recalling a piece of Olympic collecting history. The progression of Olymphilex and later the multi-genre Olympex exhibitions was mapped out on 180 display sheets using philatelic artifacts, from Olymphilex 1985 in Lausanne to Olympex 2012 in London. These successful exhibitions ended here, and there has been no successful follow-up to date. After all, what is more important for Olympic collectors than exhibiting at a world exhibition held as part of the Olympic Games program?

Three-dimensional items related to Olymphilex and Olympex, such as medals, pins, catalogs, palmarès (awards/results), etc., were then placed in display showcases. Among all the exhibited items, the **Juan Antonio Samaranch Medal**, which was awarded to the former Chairman of Olympsport, Jaroslav Petrásek, in 2012 for promoting Olympic philately, was placed in a place of honour.





Course of WOCF Prague 2025

After seventeen months of preparations, the decisive moment finally arrived. That day was Friday, May 30, at 11 a.m., when the Chairman of the Organizing Committee and President of Olympsport, Josef Kočí, opened the three-day World Olympic Collectors' Fair and welcomed 95 exhibitors from 18 countries, spanning from Japan to the USA. Greetings were also delivered by the President of AICO, Christophe Ait-Braham, Zdeněk Škoda, Vice-Chairman of the COA (Czech Olympic Academy), and David Beer, representative of the Czech Post. The entire opening ceremony was moderated by Jakub Bažant, a sports editor for Czech Television (

Various artifacts were offered for sale or exchange: pins, postage stamps, medals, tickets, mascots, torches, books, flags, clothing, plaques – all themed around the Olympic Games and Olympism. In short, the five intertwined rings are a global phenomenon of our time.










An essential part of such an event is the cultural program. The evening before the opening, fair participants had the opportunity to take a guided tour of Tyršův Dům, which in 1925 became one of the venues for the VIII Olympic Congress, and this year commemorated the 100th anniversary of its opening. Those present showed great interest in the exhibition organized by Olympsport, which was dedicated to philatelic artifacts issued for the 1925 Olympic Congress. This was followed by a cruise on the Vltava River onboard a historic steamboat.



















On the penultimate evening, a gala dinner was held at Prague's most renowned and visited restaurant and oldest brewery, **U Fleků**. Here, AICO President, Christophe Ait-Braham, thanked the organizers, led by Chairman Josef Kočí, for the smooth running of the event, the kind welcome, and the hospiality, and presented him with an award for his contribution to the development of Olympic collecting and culture in the Czech Republic and worldwide.













The Czech Post also prepared and offered for sale a **postal postcard** commemorating the 100th anniversary of the VIII Olympic Congress, which took place from May 29 to June 4, 1925, in Prague.

Olympsport, in cooperation with the Czech Post, prepared two **souvenir sheets**. One was dedicated to the 28th World Olympic Collectors' Fair, featuring the **Discus Thrower** stamp and the fair's logos in a bilingual overprint. The second commemorated the 100th anniversary of the VIII Olympic Congress 1925, featuring the Discus Thrower stamp and a **series of overprinted postage stamps** that were originally issued in 1925, alongside the hand-cancellation postmark on the overprint.






The Organizing Committee also issued **four postcards** and a **series of three pins** for collectors and visitors of the 28th World Olympic Collectors' Fair.

Budget and Financial Result of WOCF Prague 2025

The following circumstances primarily contributed to the balanced financial result:

- Financial subsidies from the IOC (International Olympic Committee), the COC (Czech Olympic Committee), and a private donor.
- The selection of service providers with whom Olympsport had collaborated in the past.
- The work of many volunteers who worked without entitlement to financial reward throughout the preparation and execution of the WOCF.

Regarding the pricing for services and events for exhibitors and participants, the organizer, similar to the preceding WOCF 2023 Paris, refrained from using packages with various categories (including benefits increasing with price — with the exception of the tables). Exhibitors and visitors were thus able to book tables and all individual events separately.

The price of a table (width 85 cm, length 100 cm) including a welcome bag (containing a bag with the WOCF logo, a participant badge, the official program, a set of postcards, and promotional materials for Prague) was set as follows:

For the first and second table: 75.00 EUR

• For the third and subsequent tables: 50.00 EUR

Other paid services included:

• Cultural visit – Tyršův Dům and Vltava River cruise by steamboat: 80.00 EUR

Concluding dinner – Gala Dinner: 110.00 EUR

In addition to these paid services, the organizers prepared the traditional Silent Auction. The financial proceeds from this auction covered the costs of the venue rental, the welcome drink, and refreshments, while the event primarily served as another opportunity for a friendly gathering.

Postcards from Prague: My Visit to the 2025 World Olympic Collectors' Fair

Prague has long perched at the top of my travel wish list, and this year's World Olympic Collectors' Fair (Figure 1) offered the perfect excuse to finally make the trip. As one of the few European cities largely untouched by the destruction of the 20th century's two world wars, Prague (Figure 2) remains a jewel box of historic charm, and it didn't disappoint.

Arriving a day early to settle in, I checked into the aptly named Hotel Olympik (Figure 3), the official show hotel. As a member of the AICO Executive Board - AICO being the International Association of Olympic Collectors and the WOCF organizer-Ihad the privilege of staying onsite. Built in the 1970s with hopes that Prague would host the 1980 Olympics (spoiler alert: Moscow got the nod [Figure 4]), the hotel is a time capsule of that era, albeit with some modern touches, It also seems to be a favorite of tour groups and student travelers; on my first evening, I counted no fewer than 30 enormous tour buses parked outside!

Early arrivals on Thursday were treated to a cultural excursion to Tyrš House, birthplace of the








Figure 3-5. (Left) Olympik Hotel. (Middle) An amusing postcard from the Museum of Communism in Prague: Misha, the 1980 Olympic mascot, but holding a kalashnikov! (Right) WOCF Organizing Committee President, Josef Kočí, at the Opening Ceremony. An Olympic flag with the signatures of all the attendees is on the wall.

Czech Sokol Movement. Much like Germany's Turnverein, the Sokol (meaning "falcon") movement blended cultural pride with athleticism, with a particular focus on gymnastics. We toured the impressive 9th-century building, taking in historical artifacts and a fascinating

philatelic exhibit honoring the 1925 Prague Olympic Congress (Figure 6) - which, as luck would have it, took place exactly a century before our own gathering.

From there, it was off to the Vltava an evening River for cruise, complete with a generous spread of traditional Czech snacks and (naturally) some excellent local beer. While we hit a few snags with the buses - delayed departures and a last-minute vehicle swap - it didn't dampen the festive mood among the attendees. Friday, 30 May, marked the official opening of the Fair, and foot traffic was strong from the start. An Olympic flag signed by all the attendees provided a colorful backdrop for the opening

ceremonies, hosted by Czech TV personality Jakub Bažant. Josef Kočí, Chairman of the WOCF 2025 Organizing Committee, welcomed guests, joined by AICO President Christophe Ait-Braham and Czech Olympic Academy Vice-Chairman Zdeněk Škoda. Also on hand was David Beer of Czech Post, who introduced the event's commemorative stamps and postmarks. Collectors eagerly lined up to purchase the limited-edition issues and to receive two special hand-cancellations at a temporary Czech Post counter set up inside the venue. That three ladies from Czech Post did a marvelous job of postmarking all the various covers and cards brought to their table. There were two cancels available: one showing the fair logo and text (in Czech) 28th World Olympic Collectors' Fair, and the other was a view of the Vitava River and famous Charles Bridge. Both cancels were from the Prague 8 post office and dated 30.5.2025. The post office was present only on Friday so if you wanted either or both of the show cancellations you had to hustle. All postal products are shown on the next page.


The organizing committee's counter at the entrance to the show stocked all the stamps, postal card, show postcard, and other special merchandise that was for sale through out the period of the fair.

Friday evening saw collectors gather atop the Olympik for the Silent Auction, held in the hotel's penthouse. Greeted with glasses of Prosecco, bidders perused a tempting array of donated lots. I had the honor of serving as official timekeeper for the 30-minute bidding window. All but two items found new homes by night's end. Afterward, although light refreshments were available, most of us headed out for dinner.

Our AICO group stumbled upon a charming outdoor café in Prague's Old Town, a perfect setting to enjoy the warm spring evening. One pleasant surprise: Prague remains a very budget-friendly destination. A full dinner - entrée, beer or wine, dessert, and tip - came to just \$25-30 per person. And a 30-minute metro, tram ticket? A mere \$1.38!

One of the high points Saturday morning was an autograph session with two well-known Czech Olympians (Figure 7). David Svoboda, a native of Prague, was a top performer in the Modern Pentathlon, winning an individual gold medal at the London 2012 Olympic Games. Crosscountry skier, Pavel Benc, from the northern Czech town of Jablonec nad Nisou, won aa bronze medal in the 4×10 km relay at the 1988 Winter Olympics in Calgary, Canada. In addition to signing specially printed cards provided by the hosts, both athletes were happy to chat and take selfies with the attendees.

That evening we reconvened for a festive gala dinner at the legendary U Fleků, a local institution that's been brewing beer since 1499 (Figure 8). In a private room, we enjoyed free-flowing dark and light lagers and hearty Czech fare. Spirits were high, and the laughter plentiful. A hearty bravo to Josef Kočí and the entire organizing team for putting on a first-class event. I was fortunate to have been able to extend my Czechia stay for another week, savoring the hospitality of the Czech people and the timeless beauty of this storied city. I very much hope to return.

Und sie sorgte für zwei Sonderstempel -


- einen zur Olympiasammler-Messe und

Final Assessment and Acknowledgments/Thank you

When we considered organizing the WOCF, we asked ourselves what we could offer the fair's visitors, given that no Olympic Games had ever taken place in the Czech Republic, or Czechoslovakia previously held. The **100th anniversary of the VIII International Olympic Congress in Prague in 1925** was therefore unanimously chosen as the main theme for the 28th WOCF 2025, and the timing of the fair coincided with the dates of the VIII Olympic Congress 1925.

Prague, the capital of the Czech Republic, had much to offer its visitors: amazing monuments where centuries of architecture blend together, a rich cultural program, the hospitality of the locals, gourmet specialties, and last but not least, Czech beer. Participants were able to "taste" a bit of everything. The boat trip on the Vltava River offered a view of the beauty of Prague and fine wines. The visit to the National Museum provided a look at its opulent premises and the seminar by the Czech Olympic Academy on the VIII Olympic Congress. The tour of Tyrš's house recalled the history of the Sokol physical education movement, which has had and still retains an international scope. In Tyrš's house, members of Olympsport prepared a small display of their exhibits featuring materials related to the VIII International Olympic Congress.

The centre of the main events of the 28th WOCF was the **Hotel OLYMPIK** and its congress centre. The hotel stands a silent witness to the time when Prague sought to host the 1980 Olympic Games, but the political situation of that time made it impossible, and the Olympics were hosted by our "big red brother." (Note: This term refers to the Soviet Union). The hotel staff and the Double Impact agency did everything they could to make the visitors feel at home.

The highlight of the fair was the gala dinner at the renowned Prague restaurant "U Fleků," where beer has been brewed since 1499 - almost as long as Europe has known about America.

The references from the guests are overwhelmingly positive, and as the Chairman of Olympsport and the Organizing Committee of the 28th WOCF 2025 in Prague, I want to conclude by extending my thanks to **the IOC**, its Culture and Heritage Commission, and **AICO** for the trust placed in us to host the WOCF in Prague. I believe we have not disappointed this trust.

My primary gratitude, however, goes to the members of the Organizing Committee—specifically, Olympsport members **Mr. Radek Jásek, Honza Petrás, and Vašek Diviš**—and to **Branislav Delej**, AICO Vice President. His experience in organizing previous WOCFs was a great asset. Thanks are also due to **Zdeněk Škoda**, Vice-Chairman of the Czech Olympic Academy.

Last but not least, a word of thanks goes to the **Double Impact Agency** not only for hosting the Fair at the hotel's Congress Centre but also for their excellent cooperation throughout the entire preparation period. Similarly, great thanks are due to the management of **Hotel Olympik** for their accommodating approach and willingness to resolve our issues at a time when tourist interest in accommodation in Prague had significantly increased.

In my acknowledgment, I must not forget the partners who contributed to shaping the overall image of the WOCF. They included: the Czech Olympic Committee, the Czech Olympic

Academy, Czech Post, the National Museum, the Postal Museum, the Czech Sokol Community, and others.

We now pass the baton to the USA, where the WOCF 2026 will take place in **Colorado Springs** from May 22–24, 2026, and we wish them every success in their preparation and successful execution.
